It's hard to believe that this is the end of the third quarter of 2022. I have been so busy that I have lost track of time. I am grateful to the Lord for good health to keep everything going. Thank you, Jesus.

As this quarter ends, I am working hard at trying to provide relief to several countries. First to Haiti. Pray for peace in Haiti so that the container of food that is sitting in port can be delivered. Second to Puerto Rico. Hurricane Fiona caused server damage to the Island. They have no drinking water or electricity. Third is the Dominican Republic. They are also dealing with the results of Hurricane Fiona. What all this information means is that the Fourth Quarter is going to start off with at least three containers being shipped. Praise the Lord.

I want to share a testimony on how the Lord provided some funds for our folks in Gonaives, Haiti. A couple of Sunday's ago one of the people that support Harvest handed me two of the "return envelopes" that I send with each letter that we mail. I told him "They are empty. I send them to you so you can put something in them." We both chuckled because I know that he supports Harvest via online giving. There was another member of the church standing next to me, so I turned to him and handed him one of the empty envelopes and told him "Here, fill this."

On Monday morning this friend stopped by Harvest office at 7:30a.m. and handed me the envelope and said "Here it is. I filled it just like you asked me." We both chuckled and I said "Thank you brother" and he left. I didn't look at the envelope for a few hours and I was SHOCKED when I did. In the envelope there was 10 (TEN) \$100.00 bills. This young man had just donated \$1,000.00.

It just so happened that I received an URGENT message from Pastor Charlie from Gonaives and here is what he said. "Bishop I am really in trouble, I need some help I cannot feed the kids. The city of Gonaives is locked. To survive you need God and some money. The people cannot make it anymore. The images that I sent are about the people of who invaded the WORLD FOOD PROGRAM DEPOT AND TAKE EVERYTHING BECAUSE THEY ARE HUNGRY. THERE IS NO WAY TO EXPLAIN YOU WHAT WE ARE FACING. A PROBLEM OF INSECURITY, DRINK WATER, THE PRICE OF EVERYTHING IS HIGHER AND WE ARE FACING IT EVERY DAY. They attacked many catholic schools and they took everything the police force cannot stop them from doing.... That happened in Gonaives Thursday and yesterday. THE CITY OF PORT AU PRINCE IS WORSE..Tell your people that we need prayer in Gonaives..."

It was as clear as can be what I needed to do with the funds that I had just received. On Tuesday I sent Pastor Charlie the \$1,000.00 that I had just received the day before. Praise the Lord. Since that time, I have received another gift that I will be sending very soon. I am glad that I can share how the Lord provided help for our people in Gonaives, Haiti.

Our mission is to establish relationships with unchurched students and invite them to a dinner where we all prepare meals from their culture. We invite them to have their loved ones to facetime with us to make sure we prepare the meal correctly. We also want to have the students' family comfortable with their child being around our family.

In the few months we previously spent in Hungary we had the pleasure of hosting dozens of students from: India, Iran, Germany, Russia, Nigeria, Azerbaijan, US, and Hungary. They were all looking forward to continuing to meet.

We will offer the new student friends a free course in English as a second language. The introductory course is John's Gospel with the advanced course being, Mere Christianity By C. S. Lewis. We will have events in and around Budapest the students will be invited to be involved in to build cross cultural deep relationships.

We do street ministry and serve in various ways with each of these ministries. They are trustworthy ministries that a young Christian would grow in their faith while participating with our group.

We intend to have a young couple join us who already have residence. Being established in Budapest with residence permits is huge and overcomes a year of cultural adjustments that often never make it. Our goal is to have them free us up to add universities as our time enables. Their initial roles would be to handle the communications, scheduling of activities, and teach the English as a Second Language course. As soon as a student becomes a Believer they will be discipled using the same tools that we used to bring them to Christ. They will engage in street ministry and be baptized at one of the ministries we serve.

Serving the Lord in Jamaica



God has promised multiple times in His Word, that He will 'never leave you nor forsake you.' Even our increasingly graying hairs is said in Scripture will be 'flourishing', as God continues to help us, and cause us to bring Him glory.

About a month ago Lloyd began to feel a great lack/loss of energy, and some pain in the rear of his left pelvic area. The left leg doesn't respond as strongly as before: he is almost dragging the leg as he walks. His daily walking distance has had to be reduced. A visit to his doctor had him being sent to do Blood work and an MRI.

The results of the blood work was generally good, but the MRI results indicate possible bone problems (the possible condition of 'Pagets' disease was mentioned) He was referred to an Osteopathic physician, who referred him to a Physiotherapist. Lloyd has done one session and is due to return in a few days for a second. We are taking all this in stride, and trusting God to guide us as to the future.

His dental work is another factor, as his daughters have arranged for implants to be done to replace his dentures. A number of visits to his Dental Surgeon (a nephew of his) has brought him near to the end of the process. But it has been excruciatingly difficult, with great difficulty in chewing: particularly cutting of meats. His weight has never been great, and now he has lost a few pounds. We still hope he will lose his hesitation to go to the dinner table, and will recover the lost weight. His visits to his Urologist are now only twice annually, to keep check after doing prostate surgery a couple years ago. His PSA tests are good, thank God. Do pray with us about these issues, please!

Elaine is doing well, just trying to keep down her cholesterol, and slightly elevated blood-pressure. She keeps in touch with her cardiologist about occasional heart palpitations. But,, after some yard work, sweeping and raking of leaves, she usually is better.

Weather Conditions: This is hurricane season, but so far no storms or hurricanes have threatened. But the rainy season is upon us: lightning strikes have been shutting down our Wi-Fi reception, so we have been without emails or Facebook for half-week. Our T.V. got blown, so we have had to buy a new one, a flat screen 'Smart T.V.' But we are not smart enough to set it up properly enough to get our usual channels. So our Cable service will send out a technician to get it properly working tomorrow. We have missed our important News and Religious stations for many days. It feels like 'dark days' cut off from the world of news and communication.

Ministry Activities have been reduced, but with Covid-19 shut-downs now over we are making adjustments. Lloyd is no longer lecturing at either his alma mater (Bible College) or the Graduate School of Theology in Kingston. He does not like teaching virtually (by Zoom), but prefers face to face teaching. He is now mostly devoted to writing projects, along with his preaching on Missions at his local church. Keeping in touch with the missionaries, regular home prayer times for them, and financially supporting a few of them (particularly the Jamaicans who are weakly supported financially) keeps us involved. He is trying to finish up the Centenary history of his denomination, which he is co-writing with another,

in order to send it to a publisher and having it printed. In addition, he was co-opted to help in writing the two hundred year history of the Church of England in Jamaica (Anglican), since it first became a Diocese (a See) in 1834. He has been asked to reprise the report he did in his first book, on the sending of Jamaican Missionaries to Africa and to some Central and South American countries after the Abolition of Slavery in the British Empire, iof which we were a Colony. (We are currently joining in official mourning for the late Queen Elizabeth II. She was a person of evident faith in Christ, as well as a confidant of the late evangelist Billy Graham. We are praying for the new King and the grieving family, and praying that the United Kingdom will see a revival of effectual spiritual life.

Elaine: continues actively as a Lay-Preacher with the Methodist Church, but has asked to be used sparingly so that she may go back to some of the Youth involvements she had before the Covid-19 shut down. These include getting back into schools with her 'Wait & Win' program: proclaiming the wisdom of delaying sexual involvement until Marriage and allowing the Lord to transform them by putting their faith in Him, and developing strong moral and spiritual standards. She would also like to go back to the government Literacy agency youth, bring them into the Church Hall to have members instruct them in various educational and practical skills they can use in the future. She would also like to get back to having Children's Evangelistic Clubs in the churches of the Circuit. These are ministries that fill her with a sense of purpose and usefulness.

Family: Lloyd's daughter was here from Raleigh North Carolina two weeks ago, and we visited with her a couple of days in Montego Bay. She is working on Jamaican Citizenship, so that her son can respond to requests for him to possibly represent Jamaica in Greco-Roman wrestling. He has won a number of High-School and State competitions. Do continue to pray with us also for a nephew of Lloyd's who has psychological problems and resists institutional care. He is finally in such care, but is not fully submitting to the process. He also needs spiritual maturity, to grow well in his new faith experience. Pray!

Like you, we are concerned, often scared at the many world situation that cause wars and fears. We pray that peoples' hearts would turn to the Lord for HOPE. This seems to becoming a time of FEARS and much lack of reason to HOPE. People need the Lord, and we want to do all we can to point them to god and salvation through His loving Son. May each one of us, and you, make this a priority in these seemingly 'Last Days'.

We rejoice in the knowledge that God is in charge of world affairs, and He is not being taken by surprise by any happening. Remember that His Word tells us that "When you see these things beginning to come to pass, lift up your head and look up for your redemption draws near." (Luke 21:28)

We rejoice for your faithful support and prayers. Your partnership is vital to our service for Christ. We pray also for you and yours.

Dear Faithful Friends,

The situation at the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education is one of desperation. Gertrude Bien Aime has been dealing with the out of control gang situation in Haiti to try to bring food, supplies and gasoline to the Notre Maison Orphanage for children with disabilities and the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education. Gertrude says the gangs kill anyone anytime whether they are middle class or poor. Right now food is a luxury here. Things are not good and she is trying to keep the children with disabilities fed.

There are 150 children including those at Notre Maison Orphanage with special needs who want to start school at her Haitian Center for Inclusive Education, but have no funds to support the teachers or running of the school. Last June they actually tried to give the children their exams in between the gang riots. Gertrude says the gangs came close to the orphanage and so many of their neighbors ran away. She can't run because of the children. She said the police were able to control them that time.

Our goal is to get the children at the Orphanage funds for the food that is available and funds to pay the teachers, many of whom are willing to continue to provide instruction. With the economy in its current situation any registration local families would contribute to run the school is not a possibility. This is the largest inclusion program in Haiti and we are asking for your help to get Gertrude and the children through this difficult time.

There are many lessons to be learnt from nature, one of them being the seasons. Wherever we are, seasons exist. In some countries, the seasons are more distinct than in others, but they are still there.

Here in Zimbabwe, all of Africa is north of us except South Africa. We have only two distinct seasons, the dry season, winter and the rainy season or summer. Winter, around May to August, can be quite cold. White potatoes and wheat prevail then but must be irrigated. During the summer, the Country receives most of its rainfall supplied mostly by the Indian Ocean cyclones. Some crops, for example maize, soya, sorghum, and tobacco are grown in the summer. It is not unusual for the rains to be minimal or delayed. Sometimes, there can also be quite a lapse between the changing seasons often resulting in drought.

Another feature here is the changing landscape. Every season brings with it a variety of flowering trees and shrubs. For example, as winter fades, a local shade tree, the msasa, drops all its leaves (some call it Fall) and almost immediately begins to sprout new leaves in various hues of red/orange/rust/tan etc. This lasts but a few days until it is replaced by new leaves in tender shades of green. The blue/purple jacaranda appears before long and sheds its flowers on the street, sidewalk, or yard beneath. What sights to behold!

Isn't natural life like that too? Every stage has its own distinctive features – turning, creeping, walking, teething, growing into adulthood, getting into midlife, becoming seniors, and so on. Some phases are characterized by the need for help, others by an independent streak. But they all go to make up a life.

So too is spiritual life. We may recall our beginning often marked by uncertainty, sometimes doubt, and our need for reassurance. Then we embarked on what is usually called the Christian life – participation in a local church and its activities, self-confidence, busyness, perhaps years in some form of well-intentioned ministry. It is then we might begin to sense a shallowness in our relationship with the Lord and might ask ourselves: 'Is this all?', 'Have I been on the right track?', 'Has it been worthwhile?'. Then perhaps fear that we had been walking in only the shadow of something far more real and greater than we had experienced grips us as we contemplate the approaching dim light of the evening of our days here on earth.

In the Lord's grace, we begin to see our Lord Jesus Christ as the Reality of our salvation and wish we had more time to explore the depth of His riches which, sadly, were missed during most of our Christian life. We read again Colossians 2:9, 10 from the New Living Translation – "For in Christ lives all the fullness of God in a human body. So, you are complete through your union with Christ...." Other passages of Scripture lead us to conclude, 'Yes, that's what it's about Christ!', for "He is the sum of all things"; and the kind of Christians we are and the measure of His fullness in us will be determined exclusively by our knowledge of Him. As we contemplate further, perhaps we reflect on how we might be eulogized by our loved ones and we fear they might just present a brighter picture of our walk with the Lord than it really was.



I was invited by Sharath (Pastor I stay with in India) to go on a mission trip in South Sudan and Uganda (Middle of Africa) for a month from June – July 2022. Sharath knew a lady named Lucy Bona who lived in Texas who was putting a meeting together in South Sudan and Uganda.

Four people from the United States (Lucy and Jivel from Texas, Rosemary from Kansas, Ray from Florida and Sharath from India. Lucy knew some people in Aweil, South Sudan who helped with the organization.

80,000 people showed up for the first spiritual meeting of its kind for four days. Many people walked for days to attend the meetings. Our response to the calls for Salvation and Healings were huge (in the 1,000's). Then on Sunday each of us preached in a different Churches. My Church service had seven people healed and one person Born Again.

Lucy and Rosemary were both born in Juba, South Sudan and could speak the local language. As we met with Lucy's huge family (some she hadn't seen in 30 years) everyone, except us, was talking the local language, we just sat and listened. Lucy had a huge family and everywhere we went we met more of her family. She also met with local leaders.

When we were finished in Juba, Rosemary and Sharath went home. That left Lucy, Jivel and me to fly to Uganda. When we arrived in Uganda it was much nicer than in South Sudan. We spent a week at an orphanage that Lucy had supported. We baptized 21 people and fellowshipped with them for a week.

Sharath is now in Texas and will meet me in Atlanta, Ga. on October 14, 2022 to fly to India for nine months. I am really excited about spending nine months in India.


As of right now I need to buy my return ticket from India as well as money to live on. Thank you for your ongoing support. Pray for us and support my mission as the Lord leads.

There is a lot of news from our missions corner. You may remember that Stacy and I got the Make A Difference Worldwide Institute started in Onaville above Port-au-Prince, Haiti after our three-month stay in 2018. Since then the school is doing well. Our mission partner, Simi (Joseph Similien) graduated over a hundred the end of 2021 and another thirty-six in just the past few weeks.

The school primarily teaches English which is vital for those speaking only Haitian Creole. He has two and a half years of formal ESL training with the Haitian American Institute and is well qualified. All five levels of English only costs \$200 per student. We welcome scholarship donations for this rather than humanitarian financial aid.

Simi lost his young wife, Martine, suddenly and unexpectedly from a hemorrhagic stroke earlier this year. He and their seven-year-old son Jachim are soldiering on with the ministry. We have been unable to return to Haiti since the gangs have taken over most every street corner. Our plans to eventually get the Malnutrition Study Clinic to prevent Severe Acute Malnutrition in the children in Haiti have since been on hold.

I returned from a medical mission trip in June with MedReach, Inc out of Alabama. Our group camped about 8-12 hours back in the bush for two weeks and we four providers saw over 2,600 patients in two villages over two weeks. Many accepted Christ. Stacy just recently came back from a two-day mission trip with Indian Ministries of North America to a reservation in Conehatta, Mississippi.

About eight weeks ago, I was voted in as chairman of the missions committee here at our church. The House of Prayer supports some 50 missionaries around the world. More exciting though are the churches first three home-grown couples going to far distant mission fields abroad. I've never attended a true sending church. There is a distinct difference between a mission-minded church and one that goes on to also be a sending church.


