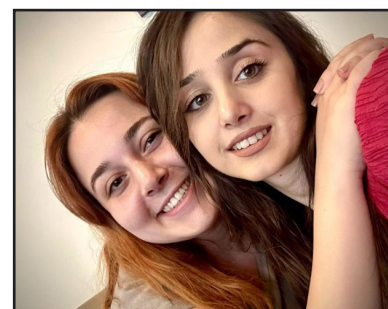
“International Friendship - Budapest” is to be our new name. I asked my dear brother Toby Sorrels if he would mind our using this name with it being so similar to the ministry in Gainesville he has served. He was enthusiastically supportive. This name best sums up what we are actively doing here in Central Europe to draw students to Christ.

A typical week at our place involves hosting three meals with students, local academics, or fellow ministry leaders. Several individual or small group meetings for discipleship and personal evangelism where we read the Word and pray together. This is relationship development with students encouraging them to actively participate by acting on the meaning of the study by bringing a friend. We practice lifestyle evangelism daily where each person we encounter is someone Christ may have something for. We all study the word together each morning and pray together fully aware that unless the Holy Spirit is alive in us, we have nothing real to offer. Many days we begin with a feeling which if allowed to stay would lead to discouragement or being lonely. But giving Him our best of a busy day is imperative!

We have wonderful news about Sibel our student from Turkey who lost family members in the terrible earthquakes last year. She is back in Turkey doing a required year as an intern teacher. Sibel and her family's lives are incredibly difficult now living far from where the earthquake devastated their lives. Sibel's teaching internship requires her to live over five hours away from family with strangers. Her family lost everything in the earthquake, add to that she must pay to be an intern. Last year before she graduated and returned to Turkey, she was troubled and said she wanted our friendship badly but couldn't tolerate pressure or arguing about religious issues. We never did those things and she acknowledged as much but her concerns were painfully real. We suspected it was the Holy Spirit's conviction as well as the devastation she experienced losing her family and home so painfully. We listened to and reassured her we didn't base our relationship with her on her becoming a Christian and abandoning Islam. Sibel was at our home almost every day afterward. We hosted her mother from Turkey and ministered Christ's peace to her. We read Psalms to this mommy whose world was devastated by the death of her daughter and son-in-law both respected judges and her beautiful home. Their condominium was ten stories and less than five years old, Anna, Sibel and her husband on the third floor barely got out before it collapsed with the other building in the greater area. Over a hundred people in the building died. Anna was so obviously traumatized but came because she was concerned for Sibel and the American family befriending her. When we asked her if we could pray for her a Christian prayer for Yahweh's peace to comfort her, she said yes. Selena went over to her and something truly holy happened. Both women broke and the presence of the Holy Spirit transformed these ladies' countenances as they wept and held each other.

I'd love to tell you that once we prayed everything made sense and their lives became "normal" again, but it's not true. Sibel loved reading the Bible and our company so much she was with us almost every day. The irreconcilable loss and her confusion with a loving God allowing suffering was hard and she was beginning to escape the numbness and shock that her mind had been protected by. By Easter week she was secretly planning to deal with her sometimes overwhelming pain and hopelessness. On Easter Eve Olson had the dream and shared it with Sibel later the next day when she came over having missed church and the celebration lunch, she had confirmed she would attend. Weeks later Sibel shared with us that eve of Easter she intended to overdose with the drugs she had accumulated but kept getting texts from us and others in our little community of international friends. Selena and I had no idea of Olson's dream and have

not heard of it from Olson to this day. When Sibel came over after missing Easter she and Olie went shopping at clothing stores by our place. Olson said she had cried in her sleep because of a painful dream about Sibel. Sibel asked what her dream was. Olson told her she committed suicide, and her heart couldn't handle losing her and the pain of knowing she lost her sister and now (Olie) lost Sibel! Sibel was stunned and swore to Olson she would never do anything like that. Two weeks later the plane as we were leaving Budapest Sibel shared this with us via her farewell text. We were stunned and knew that intercessory prayer made the difference.

We've stayed in constant communication with Sibel and her family. Last Monday evening she was in an extremely hard place, and we could hear roommates crying in the background about their situation. Selena encouraged and prayed with her, Marianna, our Karabakh-Armenian friend who has no home to return to had called, encouraged, and prayed with her also. Turkish and Armenian people are like Samaritan and Orthodox Jews in their feelings for one another but these two and their parents love each other because of God's work and their mutual calamities. Sibel knows who Jesus is, reads her Bible, and will pray but has not believed in Him as her only hope for salvation yet. We are bringing her here to Budapest in February for two weeks and ask you to pray the Jesus she has acknowledged becomes her Lord and Savior.

It's very hard but we do not intervene in our students' struggles except to listen to them, read His word with and pray with them concerning the situation. If the Holy Spirit leads us to share their burden, we pray about how so we are not guilty of quenching the Holy Spirit's work in building their relationship and faith.

Marianna, Lilith, and Meri are Ph.D. students working two jobs trying to help their families who are exiles in Armenia. She and four others from her country are a part of our family here. All their families had to flee Karabakh when Azerbaijan attacked and displaced them from their homes. Six of us met Friday night for dinner at a Syrian restaurant. Of the five from Karabakh, one's father was shot and killed, and one cousin was burned alive and died with over a hundred others in a freak gasoline distribution/gas station fire. He was trying to fill up to flee before the invaders arrived. We've been praying, encouraging, and supporting their practical needs. We have been praying for the families to be able to leave Armenia where opportunities are minimal. Through the efforts of their university, the Hungarian government is granting the five students' families emergency asylum and support stipends. We had church when the students shared what had just happened for their families! They should be here in Budapest by Christmas.

Greetings from Romania! It has been a while since you heard from us, they have been very busy this past year there in Dumbrava.

The activity center where the kids come after school for help and lessons, was in much need of some major repairs. The heating system was very old, and part of the building was made out of mud, straw, and bricks. The bricks were getting really bad and starting to break apart, so we started the rebuilding process at the beginning of spring, and are almost complete.

We now have over 130 children ages 3-15 who attend regularly. We were able to hire a new teacher this year. We are now up to seven teachers and these ladies truly care for these children.

This story was shared with me recently. Every afternoon after school when the children come, the teachers always ask the children if they went to school that day. This one little boy said he did not go to school, and the teacher asked him why he came to the activity center and not to school. His answer was, "Because you love us!"

Gypsy kids don't get treated the same as other Romanian children. At the center, the teachers are there to help the children with schoolwork and more importantly, to share the love of Christ with them. They have lessons from the bible every day, where they learn that God loves all the children of the world.

You all have been so good and supportive towards us, and we want to thank everyone for what you have done and given here in Romania. We want God's name to be glorified through our lives and the ministry there in Dumbrava.

May you all have a Blessed Christmas and a Happy New Year!

Merry Christmas to all of you!

Here in Jamaica, we are beginning to feel the 'Christmas breeze'. Our daytime temperatures have dived our usual summertime warmth. There is also a cool wind blowing from the north. As we watch the evening news from Florida stations, we notice that as the temperatures did there into the 60s and lower, we began to feel those dips. There used to be a time when our mid-island, mountainside, Mandeville location was utilized as a location for our former colonizers, civil servants to come when the heat in the cities and towns by the seaside was too much for them to bear, but that situation has changed, as the area's population, houses, and roads have increased.

Our focus recently has shifted much to paying with and for Israel, the Hamas invasion, and the hostages they have taken. We are particularly asking the Lord to strengthen the Israeli people, and especially for them to seek the Lord's wisdom, guidance, and deliverance; and we revisit the Scripture of Psalm 83 and in the prophet Isaiah's messages of "Comfort Ye, comfort ye, my people!". We know that the God who watches over Israel "does not slumber or sleep"! May they turn their eyes and hearts towards their Messiah, for His deliverance. Our hearts do yearn for their national Salvation and that of their enemies as well. We ask that the Apostle Paul's words in Romans 11:26 "All Israel will be saved" when the Deliverer comes out of Zion and turns away ungodliness from Jacob.

Our confidence is that God is at work, as he prepares both Israel and their Islamic enemies to acknowledge the God whom their progenitor Abraham followed, as their own true and only God. We also ask you to join us in prayer for God's clear work in our geographical neighbor, Haiti. Their situation is so desperate that many are risking their lives on the seas in un-seaworthy boats to come to Jamaica seeking help. Many of our Nationals have been missionaries in Haiti, and numerous of us have gone to that country on mission trips and after hurricanes and earthquakes to help make both their physical and spiritual conditions better. Do join us in your heartfelt prayers for them.

Most of you have been our faithful prayer partners over so many years. We thank you greatly. We cannot express adequately our profound gratitude for your faithful and sacrificial support as we seek to serve the Lord and his Church's work here. There is a song that says, "Thank you for giving to the Lord, I am a life that was changed!" Many young men and women who were students at Regent Bible College of the Caribbean are now pastors, children, and church evangelists as we have helped to prepare them for Christ's service and ministry.

The Mandeville Ministers Fraternal (now 'Association') has also benefitted from our many involvements which you have enabled us to be part of. Many also are the children from Primary and High Schools who have made Jesus their Savior, through the "Wait & Win" program. Because you gave to us, we have been enabled to help others." While we serve the Lord, we also help others take the gospel to other nations and encourage our local churches to do the same.

Haitian Center for Inclusive Education with Dr. Don DeVito

Serving the Lord in Haiti



For years you have been seeing our updates about this inspiring school for children with disabilities and the foundational work Gertrude Bien Aime has been doing to provide an inclusive education to over 100 children. Through faith and determination, Gertrude has worked to pay the rent on the school and to keep teachers funded to provide God's work to this underserved population.

The gang violence in Haiti has increased in the Notre Maison orphanage area and yet Gertrude continues to transcend these risks to keep the school going. This school is a foundation of inclusive practice and facilitation in the country. We are at a point where the owners of the school compound are going to sell it and move on. Gertrude is praying for the support to put a down payment on the compound which would allow her to pay a mortgage rather than rent and keep this epitome of God's work safe in the hands of her and the children with special needs who attend in Port au Prince for generations to come.

The plan that Gertrude created is to request 200 supporters to provide \$100 a month for 3 months to reach this goal in time to purchase the school before it is sold elsewhere. Christmas greetings to you! While many of you are trying to keep warm, we in Zimbabwe are battling with temperatures of 87 to 105.8F. Whatever our climatic or personal challenges, we thank God for the privilege that we as believers have to remember, marvel at and celebrate, with deepest meaning, the coming into this world of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. Indeed, “unto us, a Child is born, unto us a Son is given”. He is God's incredible Gift to mankind! May this truth not be minimized as we celebrate.

The question has been asked, how do folks celebrate Christmas in Zimbabwe? Well, culturally, it is a family time. So, most businesses begin to close by the 15th of December and reopen the first week of January. This gives employees a chance to travel to their family homes (their Kumusha) for the holiday and be back to work in January. Non-indigenous folk would generally travel abroad or go to the local lakes, safari lodges or other holiday resorts. Few of the more affluent folk celebrate Christmas at home.

Some of the City churches sing carols on the Sundays preceding Christmas, have a candlelight service during Christmas week as well as a Christmas morning service. Some private schools have Christmas programs or allow their premises to be used for Christmas plays. Many of the shops also play Christmas carols. Few trees graced our local shopping areas this year, no doubt due to the increased power cuts.



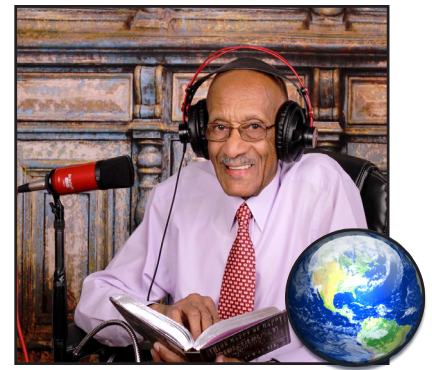
Last week, we had the privilege of visiting Georgina, one of our young missionary friends, who has recently moved into a two-bedroomed traditional roundhouse which she has been building in phases, as finances allowed. There is still a lot to be done. But despite the many challenges she has faced as a single woman building in a male-dominated society, she is unfazed. Georgina gets water from neighbors and uses a single solar lamp for lighting, but she is totally at peace and thankful to God for His provision. She has named her little house “Bethel” – God's lighthouse in a community that is riddled with syncretism, witchcraft, ancestral worship, and the like. Few in the community would guess that this young lady has a master's degree, speaks 7 languages, interprets at international conferences for her mission's organization, and holds a responsible position at their offices in Harare. We thank our Lord for her love and commitment to Him who 2000 years ago, left the splendor of heaven to come and live among us so He could reveal the Father to us that we might have eternal life.

REJOICE WITH US! Even as we end this letter, our Heavenly Father is showering His blessings on us with the first long-awaited rain shower! How much we pray for more!!

Greetings dear ones in Christ!

The last month or so has been an absolute whirlwind, but God was in every activity, and we were able to help many people. There was great joy as well as overwhelming sorrow. But in all things to God be the Glory.



We had anticipated building a home in October, and God provided for that to happen. Austin began collecting materials about two weeks before the project was to begin. Because of the large crowds that our work attracts, we have decided to only work close to our home. So, Austin chose a family that lives about five minutes up from our home. The Dieujuste family worked very hard on the project. We require them to provide all the rock, gravel, and water for the home. If they are able, they also provide a small breakfast and big lunch to the workers, in keeping with the Haitian traditions. The Dieujuste family along with the work crew, really pulled through, and with the gracious help of God, this home was completed in an astounding 12 workdays!

One of the old people we provide monthly food for, and whom we hold very dear, Fato, had a bad fall in his yard on Thursday. By the time Austin was notified, he had been lying in his yard on the ground for over 24 hours. Over the space of three weeks, we, along with two other Haitian families and another missionary, provided care. Despite all our best efforts, his situation was pretty near hopeless. Fato passed out of this life and into the hands of Our Loving Creator. We assisted with the preparations and Austin and Gilbert took his body to the cemetery. Because of your faithfulness in giving, we were able to pay for all of the medical bills incurred, which was a relief to the family.



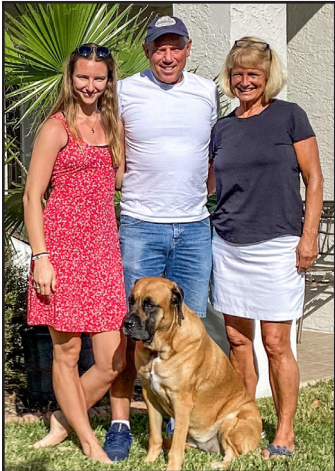

We wish you a very special Christmas this year. Thank you so much for your prayers and encouragement as we have moved back into ministry this Fall. We are very thankful to the Lord that both of our VISAs to live in the U.S. have been approved and should be in our hands soon.



We have spent the past 6 weeks learning as much as possible from Danny Thomas as he prepares to retire. We have truly appreciated Danny's never-ending sense of humor and passion for the ministry of Harvest. We are excited to continue the existing work of Harvest in supporting its numerous foreign missionaries, and we are also thankful that Danny and the Harvest board are eager to advance the Gospel of Jesus in new ways. One such way that we have sensed God's leading is the renovation of the Harvest warehouse and then transforming it into a studio set where we hope to produce a top-quality children's video series that will teach today's generation of children about God and how He sent His son Jesus to save the world.

We ask for your prayers as we believe that the Lord might be leading Harvest in a new direction. This would be in addition to supporting the existing missionaries. The vision is to reach children using the media that they know. In other words, to really reach the many children who do not know anything about God or maybe have not even heard the name of Jesus, we need to speak to them in their language, not meaning English, Spanish, or French, (although that could come after). The language we need to use to reach this generation of children is video language. Coming from Canada, we have seen firsthand how there is an entire young generation of children who are an "unreached people group". We desire to reach the children of this generation with the Gospel.

The goal is to transform the Harvest warehouse into a studio set where we can film and produce a video series that will appeal to children and will tell them about God and the gospel of Jesus Christ. This is entirely out of our realm of expertise, but we believe that God will bring the right people alongside us as we step out and begin this journey. We would want the video to be on YouTube or some site where children can access and watch the show without cost or commercials. There is no intention of making money in this endeavor. We are beginning this new project by cleaning out and preparing the warehouse. Eventually, we are hoping that some work teams might come to Ocala to help us renovate the warehouse and build the studio set.



We had a great visit with our friends the Yordys as they stopped by Florida to see us on their way home from Haiti. Scott and Mandy are continuing to minister in Haiti, despite the danger and obstacles. Scott is managing the mission construction department from a distance with four to five trips into Haiti each year. He has a good crew of Haitian workers who can build and install around 30 church roofs a year.

We are also thankful for Dan and Duane and their crew from Michigan who continue to oversee and manage the operation of the Cite Lumiere hospital. They also take trips to Haiti several times a year and are a lifeline for the Haitians at this difficult time.

Thank you so much for your prayers as we adjust to life in Florida and our new mission with Harvest. Thank you also for your support. 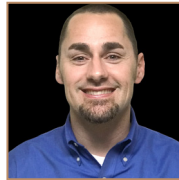

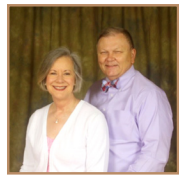
